SHORTER CATECHISM QUESTION 45

Q: Which is the First Commandment?

A: The First Commandment is, THOU SHALT HAVE NO OTHER GODS BEFORE ME. Comments:

God wrote the Ten Commandments on two tables of stone. On the first table he wrote the first four commandments, which contain our duty to God; and on the second he wrote the remaining six commandments, which contain our duty to man. This First Commandment teaches us the only proper *object* of worship. It is GOD – and beside him there is no other. This is the simple meaning of the commandment, but in the Shorter Catechism each commandment is explained and expanded, by showing first what it bids us do, than what it *forbids* us to do, and lastly, what *special reasons* or motives there may be for its observance.

Dear brethren, this week, we continue the article entitled "Will you end well?" This is a 4-part series written by Rev Mark Chen, pastor of First Evangelical Reformed Church in Singapore.

Will You End Well? (Part 2)

In the previous part of the article, I wrote about the need to end well in light of news of friends going home to glory. How prepared are we to die? Paul was prepared at anytime to meet God (2 Timothy 4:6-8). The reasons he was ready were that he had completed his work – he fought a good fight, he finished his course, and he kept the faith.

This is why Christians ought to fight against self and sin, persevere in and keep the faith, and to continue to do what God has required of us.

As the church is aging – pioneers are in their twilight years – and illness is catching up with us; it is important to explore again the topic of death. And while we expect acute illness that leads to death at the end of life, we should also not be surprised with acute terminal illness in the prime of life.

These challenges – acute and prolonged chronic debilitating illnesses – can cause distress, desperation, and they can also challenge convictions. This is why we need scriptural perspectives to help prepare us to seek the Lord, to prepare for death or the long haul, and to prepare us to care, comfort, and exhort one another.

Death Is a Judgment

Now, we know that death is a result of original sin (Romans 5:12). Everyone will die. Death is a result of the curse – and well-deserved by all (Psalm 11:6).

God does use catastrophic events – like illness – as judgment, but he doesn't always judge immediately. In the days of Noah, when the imagination of man's heart was continually evil, God waited 120 years –demonstrating his mercy (1 Peter 3:20). We should never deny that God does use such events to judge (Exodus 9:10-11).

Christian Death Is Not a Judgment

But we must affirm this: God never uses death, acute illness, and such calamities as judgment for his people. Psalm 116:15 – "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints." When his people die, it is precious to God. In other words, as God sets a high value on the lives of his people, he also sets a high value on the death of his people.

The death of Christians is under his superintendence – they're not accidental but arranged by God. So whether a Christian dies at 20 or 80, it is by the will of God.

This is even the case when Christians die and suffer unexpectedly. Job's children died in a catastrophic manner. God may mercifully take away a believer to prevent him from sinning anymore (1 Corinthians 11:29) – but all of this is done in his love and mercy toward us.

Christian Death Works Good

Our time on earth is done; our work is done. Moses was taken even though he was still spritely.

Deuteronomy 34:5-7 – "So Moses the servant of the LORD died there in the land of Moab, according to the word of the LORD. And he buried him in a valley in the land of Moab, over against Bethpeor: but no man knoweth of his sepulchre unto this day. And Moses was an hundred and twenty years old when he died: his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated."

That is why for Christians, untimely death, catastrophe, acute illnesses are not seen as condemnations from God. After all, nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus (Romans 8:38-39).

We should, in such very difficult times, learn to echo Job's words in Job 1:21 – "The LORD hath taken away; blessed be the name of the LORD." He was comforted in knowing that just as God had given him his children in birth, so it was God who had taken them in death.

Such death works humility. We realize that God doesn't need us on earth. Our lives are not indispensable. God took Elijah home, as he did Moses, because there were others to continue the work. Jehu, Hazael, and Elisha would continue the work (1 Kings 19:16).

That's why we should be comforted. When Jesus told his disciples of his imminent death, they were troubled. But Jesus told them they could have peace (John 14:27). This is why, as Christians, if we are convinced of the principles of Christian death, we can face it well.

Listen to the stark but true words of pastors in the past:

"He who fears death or is not willing to die is not sufficiently Christian." ~ Martin Luther

"If anyone cannot set his mind at rest by disregarding death, that man should know that he has not yet gone far enough in the faith in Christ." ~ John Calvin

"No one has made progress in the school of Christ who does not joyfully await the day of death and final resurrection." ~ John Calvin

While we know that this should be the case, we do struggle with death, acute illness, terminal chronic illnesses. The Christian will experience trauma, doubt, and fear. We will explore these in the next pastoral voice.

But let us bolster ourselves with the truths on death – even though it is a judgment on sinners, as Christians, it is no longer a judgment. Christ has removed the curse of sin and death. And because we are children of God, our deaths are precious to him.

So when such calamities come on us and the family, let us fight those words of doubt and judgment that so easily come to us as accusations from Satan. Let us find, instead, in Christ, his words of assurance.
