## **SHORTER CATECHISM QUESTION 61**

## Q: What is forbidden in the Fourth Commandment?

A: The Fourth Commandment forbiddeth the omission or careless performance of the duties required, and the profaning the day by idleness, or doing that which is in itself sinful, or by unnecessary thoughts, words, or works, about our worldly employments or recreations.

## Comments:

This commandment forbids: 1. The omission of Sabbath duties; 2. The careless discharge of them; 3. Being idle; 4. Committing sin; 5. Being engaged, without proper reason, in worldly matters.

## Scriptural Reference:

Isaiah 58:13, 14; Malachi 1:13

Dear brethren, this week, we will conclude the series of articles on Discipleship written by Rev Jack Sin, Pastor of Sovereign Hope Bible-Presbyterian Church in Singapore. The final article is entitled "True Disciples & Changed Lives".

# **True Discipleship & Changed Lives**

We find a clear relationship between committed discipleship and salvation. This relationship between true salvation and discipleship cannot be ignored: Salvation is a free gift; but discipleship come with a price tag. Salvation relates primarily to Christ as Saviour, discipleship to Christ as Lord. Salvation involves the will of God in redemption and reconciliation; discipleship involves sanctification and the whole will of God. Salvation's sole condition is "believe"; discipleship's conditions are abide, obey, love, deny oneself, take up the cross, follow, lose one's life, "hate" one's family, etc. Salvation is a new birth; discipleship is a lifetime of continuing growth and stewardship. Salvation depends on Christ's work on the Cross for all people; discipleship depends on a believer carrying his or her cross for Christ. Salvation is a believer's response to Christ's death and resurrection; discipleship is a commitment to Christ's lordship and hence victory over sin and walk in holiness. Salvation determines eternal destiny; and discipleship determines eternal and temporal rewards. Salvation is obtained by faith; discipleship is evidence of that faith through an obedient life of service to Christ.

The sequence of justification before sanctification, salvation before discipleship, or faith before commitment is clearly taught in the Bible. Many verses appeal for commitment on the basis of grace already received (e.g. Rom 12:1; Eph 4:1; Col 2:6). The teaching of Tit 2:11-12 is especially relevant because it explicitly relates grace to the believer's sanctification. This passage shows that commitment and obedience come in response to God's sovereign election and grace:

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world"

The grace received in salvation is witness of divine approval of the Christian commitment and discipleship. Paul uses a verb to express the idea of training that is different from the idea usually related to discipleship. The verb he chooses ("teach") is rooted in the Greek idea of training a child. Grace, when received, takes an immature person and trains him or her toward godliness. The commitment of discipleship is testimony of all true Christians. The close relationship between discipleship and salvation cannot, therefore, be separated If salvation could somehow be free but costly, to a true Christian, justification by faith alone also requires sacrifice from the sinner (costly grace) can be biblically justified.

## The Meaning of Cross-Bearing

In the first century, a cross meant shame and suffering and death. Christ in his death at Calvary is talking about forsaking everything, even your own life. "He that findeth his life shall lose it", you have your life and need to hold on to your life and faith lest you deny Christ under pressure, deny Christ under any persecution, be faithful to you calling with a transformed life bound by God's gracious power to follow Christ. You will lose your soul finally if you are not a true disciple. But the one who is willing to lose his life for His sake is evidence that he has a changed life and is supernatural. God has transformed you and put His Spirit within you to transform your heart and you cannot be unsaved once saved (Jude 24-25).

Genuine disciples do not give up in the face of threat and peril and false believers will fail. In Heb 11:38, talks about men who...who were so worthy the world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains and caves and holes in the ground. And all these having gained approval through their faith did not receive what was promised because God had provided something better for us so that they apart from us should not be made perfect.

Those faithful men were tested, and they passed the test finally. They conquered kingdoms, performed acts of righteousness, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched the power of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, from weakness were made strong, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight, women received back their dead by resurrection, others were tortured, not accepting their release. This is true discipleship.

## **Discipleship and Our Family**

Matthew and Luke have deeper thoughts on discipleship. In Matthew's account, Jesus says the one who "loves" family more than Him is "not worthy" of Him. In Luke, Jesus says no one can be His disciple who does not "hate" or love less his family and his own life. This condition reeks of a deeper commitment to Christ over our relationships on earth.

Jesus must be the Master of all of our lives if one is to be His disciple. But in both Matthew and Luke, the words are applied to believers only. In Matthew, the saying is Christ gave a warning about family members who may be divided over our commitment to Christ (10:34-35). In such a situation, a person who is convinced that Jesus is the Messiah will have his loyalty tested by trials and testing in relationships. This would present a great temptation to close family ties and harmony over one's identity with Christ, but the true disciple will always pass the test.

We must be totally loyal to Christ. The Bible teaches that God offers salvation to some people He has chosen while they were yet sinners and requires their love and loyalty to Christ (Rom 5:6-8; I John 4:10). Furthermore, it speak of salvation as Matthew records that to Christ makes or shows one to be "not worthy" of Christ (Matt 10:37). The statement about unworthiness as none can be worthy of Christ but yet he chose some. The unsaved are not chosen of Christ and His salvation and they do not believe In Him too. No fallen sinner is ever worthy of Christ's righteousness.

It is truth of salvation which brings some who will be believers into a deeper relationship with Jesus as Lord through predestination and their loyalty to Him.

#### **Forsake All and Follow Christ**

Another condition that Jesus gives is that "whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all ... cannot be my disciple." It shares the same context as the condition discussed above (Luke 14:27) and is addressed to believers. Following the example of a builder who of the necessity to complete their tasks, this condition demands that a believer commit or surrender our time talents and possessions are to follow God's will. The condition is in absolute terms. Are we willing to give all of yourself to Christ to be a authentic Christian. Be committed to forsake all of earthly assets that we have (Luke 14:33), to acknowledge Christ as the Lord of our lives.

A truly saved person will surrender fully to Christ as a testimony of his salvation. He or she will abide in His Word and rely on Him fully and repent of our sins and obey His word (John 8:30-31).

This passage is thought to be a condition of discipleship spoken to unbelievers, but it is not. Speaking of Jesus' ministry, John writes, "As he spake these words, many believed on him. Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed". Some were not prepared to yield Him the far-reaching allegiance that real trust in Him implies.

The condition for becoming disciples in verse 31 is an uncompromising call to believers to be changed by God. Abiding is a condition for obedience and further knowledge of the truth and our freedom in Christ. Discipleship, as abiding relationship with Christ, is elsewhere in John made conditional on our total love and obedience to Christ (e.g., 13:35; 14:15, 21, 23; 15:4, 7, 10, 14). The true disciple will prove to be real, and he or she persevere to the very end (Jude 24, 25).

#### Conclusion

The call to discipleship given in the Gospels are directed toward challenging believers to live lives of obedience, surrender, sacrifice, and self-denial. Discipleship is costly, but the cost is worth it if one has truly received at salvation. Fake Christianity will be exposed here as a believer we need to understand the sacrifice of God for his redemption, he will respond to the grace given with a reciprocal commitment of following him till the end of life. As he learns to also sacrifice, obey, and deny himself, he will become more like the Saviour who exemplifies these things. Salvation is by grace alone, but discipleship is costly. The term "costly grace" is not a paradox, although grace, by definition it is free and remembers that salvation is costly and the perfect example is Jesus Christ who paid the highest price, His life, for the sinner's redemption and he requires us to follow him with self-denial and full surrender. Let us then be true disciples of Christ today and take up our cross and deny self and follow him fully.
